ACTION PLAN FOR ARTS IN THE COMMUNITIES

INTRODUCTION

Since its founding 38 years ago, the Ontario Arts Council has been engaged in arts in the community. It has supported arts activities such as touring, community arts organizations, and arts education. The OAC has also funded the full range of arts organizations and individuals engaged in the creation, production and dissemination of art. These two areas of endeavour, to bring the arts to all Ontarians, and to support the creation and production of the arts, are the two main directives of OAC's mandate. This mandate enables OAC to contribute to the quality of life of all of Ontario's communities.

OAC's funding is generally directed to individual artists, who earn their living in the arts, and organizations that are not for profit, and committed to the professional arts. This is the model followed by the Canada Council for the Arts, and most arts councils.

CEO Donna Scott recognized and responded to the challenge to establish a balance between the two equally important and essential parts of OAC's mandate. Shortly after her appointment as CEO, she restructured the OAC in the summer of 1999. This was done in part to better deliver the mandate to bring the arts to all Ontarians. For the first time in the history of the Council, CEO Donna Scott created a director of Arts in the Community and Arts Education position. This provides executive level attention and direction to this part of the mandate through the integration of arts in the community and arts education into all of OAC's programs and services. Additionally, budget reallocations and some redesigned positions will assist to deliver the arts to all Ontarians.

OAC took another important step to fulfill this part of its mandate in the fall of 1999. With the valuable support of the Samuel and Saidye Bronfman Family Foundation, the OAC established the Task Force on Arts in the Community. OAC matched, through services in kind and financial contributions, the generous financial support of the Samuel and Saidye Bronfman Family Foundation. The objective of the Task Force was to provide the two organizations with findings and recommendations.

From November 1999 to the end of March 2000, The Task Force on Arts in the Community embarked on a process of consultation. The three members of the Task Force, operating at arms length from the OAC, spoke and listened to approximately 300 people from over 50 municipalities throughout Ontario. The Task Force's explorations concluded with the submission of their report and recommendations to the OAC. Please see attached.

OAC wishes to express its thanks to the Samuel and Saidye Bronfman Family Foundation for its support of the Task Force on Arts in the Community, and to the Foundation's Executive Director, John Hobday. To those who shared their time and wisdom with the Task Force consultations, thank you. These individuals and organizations are listed at the end of the Task Force report. OAC also thanks the three members of the Task Force, Jane Marsland, Graeme Page, and Stanley Shortt for their dedicated work.

The OAC then augmented their report with a statistical analysis of its granting activity all over the province. (A summary of this is attached) Some of these numbers suggest that OAC is doing a respectable job: OAC grant recipients are located in all 49 counties, districts and regions of the province; OAC grants are received in 100 of Ontario's 103 electoral districts. OAC supports arts education in 48 of Ontario's 72 boards of education, and reaches 900,000 students through artists touring to schools.

But there is room for improvement if you look at the numbers from where people live, their local municipality. The definition of community that is used for the purposes of the Action Plan is that of official municipalities, as determined by the Ontario Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing. Of the 535 municipalities in Ontario, OAC reaches 232, and does not reach 303. Consequently, OAC's programs and assistance do not reach significant percentages of Ontario's population. And its presence is thin elsewhere: In 43% of the municipalities where OAC grant recipients live, OAC provides only one grant in that municipality. (A list of municipalities not reached is attached)

The definition of community, described above as that of official municipalities, is primarily a geographic definition. At the same time, OAC recognizes that there are other important kinds of communities to which it has directed support. Therefore, the Action Plan also contains initiatives directed at the culturally diverse, the Aboriginal and Franco-Ontarian communities, which increases this support. The artistic community throughout the province is also central to OAC's idea of community.

While the OAC has accurate information on the location of OAC grant recipients, we currently do not have complete information on the location of all activity supported by the OAC. For example, an artist or arts organization located in one municipality may work or tour in a number of other municipalities. Although we believe that OAC's reach is greater than indicated by these statistics, we are using the current available information to guarantee that all municipalities and boards of education are reached.

To guide us in this goal – of reaching all municipalities and boards of education – we had three resources. OAC's own statistical analysis, summarized above, and OAC's experience in delivering arts in the community and supporting the creation and production of the arts are two of these. The third resource is the recommendations of the Task Force.

From its beginnings, the Task Force, its report and recommendations were intended for the larger arts and cultural sector. Numerous organizations are therefore identified as possible facilitators for recommendations, in addition to the OAC. The recommendations targeted to OAC were carefully reviewed by the OAC. We have addressed most of these. Others are not appropriate to OAC's mandate or resources, and may be of interest to other organizations.

Our analysis of these three resources concluded that we must shift the focus of some of what we do as an organization to achieve the substantial goal of reaching all the students and people of Ontario. The following Action Plan is designed to achieve this.

ACTION PLAN OBJECTIVES:

1. OAC will fulfill its mandate, in every municipality in Ontario, to support the creation, production and dissemination of the arts, for the benefit of all citizens.

The OAC will provide easy access for all of Ontario's municipalities and arts organizations to OAC programs and services, and with the expertise to sustain a healthy arts sector throughout Ontario, by providing a range of types of assistance, where required. The Action Plan, which follows, will elaborate.

2. The OAC will support the arts in every board of education in the province, through its granting programs that reach young people.

The following Action Plan Strategies will accomplish these objectives.

ACTION PLAN STRATEGIES:

1. COMMUNICATIONS

OAC will develop and implement an aggressive communications plan to target those municipalities, boards of education and arts organizations currently not reached by OAC's programs, services and other support. This communications plan will make OAC, its programs, and services, accessible to all municipalities, boards of education and arts organizations in Ontario.

The present OAC staff will respond expeditiously to requests for information and assistance from people in municipalities, boards of education and arts organizations.

2. CONSULTING, MENTORING, TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

OAC will make available to all municipalities, boards of education and arts organizations throughout Ontario the expertise of its staff. This will be available to all of OAC's current clients as well. There are several different types of service that OAC staff may provide, and when OAC staff does not possess the required expertise, they will locate it.

All OAC Officers will provide expertise in their discipline areas. For example the Community Arts Officer has great expertise in assisting communities to develop and setup community arts structures and activities. Likewise, all OAC officers will provide comparable expertise in their discipline areas.

In an innovative approach to hands-on service to the community, OAC staff from other sections will also be available to provide expertise in their areas of specialization, including research, finance, systems and communications.

OAC staff will also provide information, including programs to which organizations may be eligible to apply, and other existing resources available to them.

The Task Force reported that expertise exists in many different communities and arts organizations throughout the province. This expertise can be shared through mentoring. In this process, an emerging organization, or one facing a particular challenge, may call upon the expertise of another organization and maintain an on-going relationship with the mentor. This is one of the ways in which OAC supports partnerships. OAC staff will link organizations and municipalities that wish to participate in a mentoring process.

Where OAC does not have a requested area of expertise within its staff, it will establish a roster of experts, who will be available to the community, to provide the Technical Assistance. Technical Assistance covers a large range of needs and opportunities. It can assist organizations to increase self-reliance, capacity building, and sustainability. Examples of possible assistance include how to: access the Arts Endowment Fund and the Cultural Attractions Fund, development, governance, partnerships, and marketing. Hands-on advice on arts education and outreach will also be available. As well, assistance will be available on artistic issues.

It is OAC's belief and intention that in most cases, with possible financial assistance from the Samuel and Saidye Bronfman Family Foundation and other funders, this expertise should be available at little or no cost to the community.

3. GRANTING PROGRAMS ENHANCEMENT

- a) OAC's core business is the provision of granting programs that support the creation, production and dissemination of all of the arts. OAC will expand the criteria of appropriate granting programs to also support arts in the communities, and arts education, and ensure that these programs are accessible to all arts organizations and artists throughout the province.
- b) OAC is committed to an ongoing process of granting program evaluation, revision, and implementation to address these goals. This process includes community consultations and feedback. The establishment of new advisory councils for each sector, and one for the Council as a whole, has already been announced. They will be an important means of regular and on-going consultation.

As part of this granting program evaluation, OAC will, where fiscally possible, create new programs, and review and possibly restore granting programs which had a positive impact on communities, and were cut in the mid 1990's, such as the Community Choirs program, etc.

- c) OAC reaffirms its commitment to the peer assessment process of juries and advisory panels. The peer assessment process is a source of important information and community consultation for the OAC, and offers artists the opportunity to likewise be informed and share in the community process. OAC will expand its current commitment and ensure that every jury and panel has a minimum of one person from outside of Toronto and a minimum of one member from the Aboriginal, Franco-Ontarian or a culturally diverse community.
- d) The definition of community used in this Action Plan is that of official municipalities. At the same time the OAC recognizes the importance of other kinds of communities and will continue its ongoing commitment to these communities. The initiatives of this Action Plan will enhance and improve OAC's program and developmental support to the Aboriginal, Franco-Ontarian, and culturally diverse communities of Ontario, as well as the full range of artistic diversity.
- e) OAC will place particular emphasis on programs such as Artists in Residence, which have value in many areas of a community. This is one example of the practice of collaborative work by OAC grant recipients, in which two or more individual artists and/or organizations work together on a shared activity. This will continue to be supported by most operating and special projects granting programs of the OAC. As described in more detail below, a new program, called Touring and Collaborations, is designed in part to specifically award and support collaborations.

4. TOURING AND OUTREACH

Because of the importance of Touring and its benefits to both the artistic sector, and young people and the public, OAC will reinforce and expand its support to Touring and Outreach. Touring and Outreach will be supported in all art forms, not just the performing arts. A key priority for Touring and Outreach will be the increased emphasis on reaching remote areas of the province.

- a) Responsibility for Touring and Outreach will be consolidated under one Officer. The OAC has assigned a full time Officer to this sector. The Touring and Outreach Officer will also work with each OAC Arts Officer to coordinate and develop this essential activity in all sectors.
- b) A new OAC policy on the province-wide dissemination of all art forms, including the Visual and Media Arts and Literature, as well as the performing arts, will be put in place in 2000. Strategies for the distribution of all of the arts will be developed in the 2000-2001 fiscal year to reach all municipalities and boards of education in Ontario.
- c) Towards this end, a new granting program, Touring and Collaborations, was created and budgeted in the 2000-2001 fiscal year. This expands OAC's support to touring by \$175,000, to a total of \$500,000 in order to extend OAC's reach to more of Ontario's municipalities. This program, like others that support dissemination, will be directed to target regions of the province currently not reached by OAC.

The policy on dissemination, and the new Touring and Collaborations program will have a large view of touring. This new program will support all residencies, master classes, in-school performances and workshops, and many other forms of outreach.

- d) Linked to OAC's expanded support to touring is a redesign of its annual showcases for the performing arts, Ontario Contact and Contact Ontariois. This is effective November 2000. The new primary goal is to promote Ontario artists of excellence to tour all parts of Ontario, particularly remote areas.
- e) In addition to consolidating responsibility for Touring and Outreach under one Officer, each OAC Officer will share responsibility for furthering these goals. To alleviate the sense of isolation identified in some communities by the Task Force, each Officer will, where required, establish a plan to communicate with and assist arts organizations in their discipline area in each of the municipalities not presently reached by OAC. OAC's travel budget will be increased so that OAC staff will be an increased presence throughout the province.

Officers will also support collaboration, and dissemination, arts in the community and arts education through their granting programs, and provide consulting, mentoring and technical assistance as requested.

5. RESULTS

OAC will follow up on our progress in meeting the Action Plan objectives. OAC will track this on a weekly basis. Staff travel and granting results will be included in this review. This tracking will also include regular community consultations on the implementation.

OAC is committed to the objectives and Action plan, and will incorporate them on an on-going basis in our programs, activities, and annual budgeting process

We will also be alert to opportunities to have one or more segments of the Action Plan funded by other sources.

OAC will provide progress reports at each meeting of the board of OAC.

ACTION PLAN BUDGET

By the time the Action Plan will be approved, at least three months of the current fiscal year will have passed. Consultations with OAC's Director of Finance have indicated that we are able to finance this Action Plan for the current fiscal year. No additional staff will be required to implement the Action Plan. OAC is proud to be in a position to do this.

OAC is committed to the objectives and actions of this plan, and will incorporate them on an ongoing basis into our annual budgeting process. These objectives and plans will be a priority for the budget planning process for the next fiscal year. By the time this planning process has commenced, we will be in a better position to know the demand and uptake of the new initiatives contained in the Action Plan for budgeting purposes. We will also be alert to other possible funding opportunities from other sources for the next fiscal year for the Action Plan.

There are four components of the Action Plan: Communications; Consulting, Mentoring, Technical Assistance; Granting Program Enhancement; and Touring and Outreach. We estimate the cost of the Action Plan for the balance of this fiscal year to be approximately \$940,000. Of the \$940,000, \$570,000 is in this year's budget. Approximately \$60,000 of support is expected from The Samuel and Saidye Bronfman Family Foundation. This totals \$630,000. The remaining amount of \$310,000 will be found in our current budget primarily from budgeted surplus.

OAC'S FINANCIAL SUPPORT TO ARTS IN COMMUNITIES

Total OAC support to arts in communities

- OAC's support to arts in municipalities outside Toronto was \$10.5 million in 1999/2000.
- This support represents 41% of OAC support in Ontario.
- Granting support in municipalities outside Toronto amounted to \$8.6 million in 1999/2000, while non-granting support outside of Toronto totaled \$1.9 million.

Granting in communities outside Toronto compared with population and professional artists

- Artists and organizations outside Toronto account for 41% of applications received by OAC, 45% of grants funded by OAC, and 41% of the total dollar value of OAC grants in Ontario.
- The areas outside Toronto account for 78% of Ontario's population and 61% of Ontario's professional creative artists (based on Statistics Canada's 1996 Census).

Communities reached by OAC granting

- OAC grant recipients are located in all 49 counties, districts and regions in Ontario.
- In 1999/2000, OAC grant recipients were located in 100 of the 103 Ontario electoral districts.
- In 1999/2000, OAC grant recipients resided in 177 different Ontario municipalities, representing 33% of the 535 municipalities in Ontario.
- Often the artistic activity funded through OAC granting takes place in a different municipality than the residence of the grant recipient. 55 additional municipalities were reached by OAC funding through the location of artistic activity. OAC therefore reached 232 Ontario municipalities, or 43% of the 535 Ontario municipalities.
- The 232 municipalities reached by OAC account for 90% of Ontario's population.
- In 80 of the 177 municipalities (45%) where grant recipients reside, OAC granting support totals \$5,000 or less.
- Similarly, in 76 of the 177 municipalities (43%) where grant recipients reside, OAC has only one grant in that municipality.

Arts education outside Toronto

- Nearly 900,000 students work with artists every year as a result of OAC's investment in province-wide arts education programs. Approximately 57% of these students reside outside of Toronto.

Boards of Education presently reached by the Artists in Education Program

OAC presently reaches 48 of Ontario's 72 Boards of Education. Additionally, two Aboriginal Educational Authorities are reached by this program.
