Aboriginal Artists in Schools 2016-17

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In the coming year, this program will be renamed Indigenous Artists in Schools. This program creates opportunities for artists who identify as status or non-status First Nations, Inuit or Métis to engage with students across Ontario.

OAC considers "Indigenous arts" to be anything created by Indigenous artists.

History and background of this program

Aboriginal Artists in Schools (AAIS) was created in 2009 as a component of the Artists in Education program, in response to demand from teachers to be able to access a list of Indigenous artists. This program supports Indigenous artists of all backgrounds, working in all arts practices, to work in schools, and provides opportunities for teachers to work with Indigenous artists on a wide variety of types of projects from year to year – from filmmaking to theatre, from hip hop to pow wow dance, from moccasin-making to abstract painting, and more.

All artists who identify as Indigenous are eligible to apply and to receive an AAIS grant. Projects may be about any subject and in any artistic discipline.

Artists are funded only for the projects listed here. If you wish to contract artists to teach on other topics, please negotiate with them separately. Artists have the right to decline requests to incorporate additional topics. Not every Indigenous person can speak to every topic.

Arts Education at the Ontario Arts Council

Since the inception of the Ontario Arts Council we have supported classroom-based, sequential, hands-on creative learning workshops for young people led by professional artists. We believe that these workshops help to support the important work carried out by classroom teachers, help to address curriculum outcomes, create a valuable experience for professional artists and most importantly help to create a dynamic learning experience for learners.

The OAC recognizes and supports excellence across ethno-racial, artsmaking, regional and linguistic communities. We uphold the value of treating all Ontario-based artists with equality, dignity and respect. We are confident that doing so helps to foster a greater understanding of a diverse range of artists and their art forms and affirms the power of creativity to build bridges across communities and experiences.

How it works

This is a list of artists who have received funding to work in Ontario schools to deliver projects that are at minimum 25 hours in length with each school. A minimum of 5 hours must be spent with each group of learners. For every 25 hours, 5 may be used for preparation and planning.

The Ontario Arts Council funds approximately 80% of the artist's fee. Schools are required to make a contribution of a minimum of **\$11.25 per hour**. Artists may require additional materials. Schools are required to cover material costs and other like expenses. **Some artists may need to charge HST**. Please check with the artist before confirming the booking.

Who can participate?

Teachers of all subjects can access this list of recipients. Projects may involve any educational institution registered with the Ontario Ministry of Education from Junior Kindergarten to Grade 12, including private schools, school authorities and education authorities and First Nations schools who are registered with the Ontario Ministry of Education and/or federally-funded.

Important information for teachers

Please be aware that while the Ontario Arts Council advises artists to obtain a police reference check, we do not confirm that this check has been completed. It is the school responsibility to verify this document when inviting guests into the school. It is also the school's responsibility to review school or school board health and safety protocols with the visiting artist prior to commencing the project.

Travel funding

Artists can apply for travel funding to visit your school if it is more than 25 km one way from home. Artists can access funding for travel and accommodation if the school is more than 75 km one way from home. Funds are limited and are disbursed on a first-come, firstserved basis.

Do you know of artists you'd like to work with in your school?

Encourage them to contact us! We will help them with the application process.

In keeping with the oral traditions of Indigenous peoples, and to make the program accessible, artists have the option to apply orally through a recorded interview process. Decisions are made by a jury of Indigenous artist educators and arts professionals.

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The Arts Education Positive Partnership

Intended for artists and classroom teachers to complete together.

The success of arts education activity that occurs in schools depends on the partnership between school officials, teachers, administrators, and the artists. Along with this checklist we provide artists and classroom teachers with a basic contract (which does not address every finite point of the engagement in order to leave room for flexibility and creativity).

Establishing and maintaining open communication throughout the process is key to ensuring an enjoyable and valuable process experience. Please take the time to review and respond to the checklist together (in person, phone, e-mail or fax).

- The goals of the workshop have been discussed (activities, skills that will be acquired by learners).
- The classroom teacher (and in some instances other school officials, parent advisory members) has had the opportunity to ask questions and make suggestions (being mindful of the parameters of the workshop) in order to ensure a mutually rewarding process.
- The artist and classroom teacher:
 - have discussed issues pertaining to hosting an artist in the classroom such as the creation of nametags for all learners, an announcement acknowledging the presence of the artist in the school, identifying areas for the artist to eat lunch, store supplies...
 - o are aware that the artist cannot be left alone with students in the classroom, under any circumstance.
 - o have discussed the tasks which need to be carried out before, during and after the workshop.
 - o have identified and agreed upon a communications protocol as it relates to lateness, cancellations, feedback and updates.
- The classroom teacher has identified health and safety protocols or classroom norms which may impact the workshop.
- The artist has given the OAC program evaluation form to the classroom teacher in order to ensure completion immediately following the project.
- The artist and teacher have reviewed the OAC Arts Education Access and Diversity Statement, which includes excerpts from the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and the Ontario Human Rights Code, and agree to uphold its principles.
